Background Information

This proposed program modification is to provide for the offering of upper-level nursing courses at USC Union and USC Sumter in order to promote access to students into the USC Aiken School of Nursing program (SON) and allow USC Union and USC Sumter to offer the lower level nursing courses required for the BSN. USC Aiken SON shall establish a baccalaureate nursing program of study at USC Union and USC Sumter. USC Union and USC Sumter will provide all of the non-nursing courses on each of their campuses, including the required core and general education courses. The upper division nursing courses will be provided by USC Aiken through a combination of distance education and live instruction. All lab activities will be held on the USC Union and USC Sumter campuses, and all clinical experiences will take place in Union, Laurens and neighboring counties for USC Union and in Sumter county and neighboring counties for USC Sumter.

Students may apply for admission to USC Union or USC Sumter by indicating nursing as an interest. After successful completion of the required courses necessary to have before applying to the SON, students may apply to the USC Aiken SON on the USC Union campus or the USC Sumter campus. Students must meet the same entry requirements as other students applying for nursing on the USC Aiken campus. All nursing courses will be taken by students on the USC Union campus and the USC Sumter will be the same courses taken by students on the USC Aiken campus, but students admitted to the USC Union and USC Sumter cohorts will take all nursing courses, clinicals, and labs on their respective campuses. Students will be admitted once a year in the fall.

The target audience includes students attending USC Union and USC Sumter who wish to pursue a baccalaureate in nursing degree and desire to stay on their respective campuses. The degree will be a USC Aiken degree, but offered on the other two campuses. This is central to the mission and strategic plan to strategically grow the student body, and to be a key resource for pre-professionals. It also supports the Institute of Medicine recommendation to increase the percentage of BSN prepared nurses by 2020.

Assessment of Need

Provide an assessment of the need for the program modification for the institution, the state, the region, and beyond, if applicable.

Dean Catalano approached USC Aiken about this partnership as a result of being approached by leaders in Union County to find ways to recruit and retain more nurses in Union County. There is a need for more registered nurses in Union County's healthcare system. The Union County Healthcare Foundation has donated \$25,000 to USC Union for this nursing program. USC Union has already recently received a \$750,000 gift designated to support nursing.

Dean Sonntag approached USC Aiken about this partnership also as a way to recruit and retain more nurses in Sumter Country.

There is a need for BSN prepared nurses in the state of South Carolina.

For each campus, 16 students will be admitted each fall as a cohort. We expect at least two students to drop out from each cohort after the first year. So for Fall and Spring 2019 we have 16 new students. Year Two (2020) will have 14 students from the first cohort plus 16 new students for a total of 30. Fall of 2021 will be the final semester of the program for 14 students in cohort 1 plus 14 students from cohort 2, plus 16 new students in cohort 3 (14+14+16 = 44). After the program is at fully in-process, we expect 44 students each Fall and 30 students each Spring.

Faculty

Yes, this partnership will necessitate new faculty and staff in order to be implemented.

USC Union and USC Sumter will each hire and fund an advisor/program coordinator to ensure there are 16 students per site ready to enter the USC Aiken program after two years. This person will be responsible for advising all students as they are admitted to these colleges who are on the pre-nursing track. This person will also be responsible for getting contracts with each of the clinical facilities needed for student clinical experiences. This person will also keep up with student scheduling once students are admitted into the nursing program and keep track of required credentialing materials. This person may possibly teach courses. The minimum requirement is a MSN.

There will be a need for one faculty member at each site to teach both NURS 201 Introduction to Nursing Practice and NURS 307 Health Assessment for labs and clinicals in the first semester of nursing. This person will also be responsible for administering and grading all exams in nursing courses, grading all papers and other assessments, and administering the ATI proctored exams with each course in which these exams are embedded.

There will also need to be a faculty member for each campus trained in high fidelity simulation who can run and teach simulation labs beginning in the 2nd semester of the nursing sequence.

Adjunct/clinical faculty will be needed for each clinical course.

One new nursing faculty is to be added at USC Aiken in Year 4, to help alleviate any additional burden on current faculty.

Resources

Library Resources: No additional library resources are required.

Equipment: At least one dedicated lab to be used for health assessment and skills labs. Each lab would need to be fully equipped with 4 hospital beds and other lab equipment as needed. (A list of necessary skills lab equipment is attached.) In addition, a high fidelity simulation lab will be needed for each of the Union and Sumter campuses for semesters 2, 3, & 4 of the nursing sequence with both adult and pediatric manikens.

Two classroom at USC Aiken will need to be outfitted for distance learning before students begin the nursing courses. Additional classrooms will need to be outfitted in Year 2 or 3 until all 4 USC Aiken classroom are outfitted for distance learning. The funding for this has been promised by USC Union and USC Sumter.

The proposed program will have some impact on the existing degree program/services at USC Aiken. For most upper level courses, faculty will have to teach their face-to-face classes in rooms outfitted for distance education so that the Union and Sumter students will be able to participate in the classes. This means that faculty on the USC Aiken campus will have additional papers, tests, assignments to grade. Additionally, a faculty member at USC Aiken will have a reduced teaching load in order to be the coordinator/liaison between the USC Aiken campus and Union/Sumter campuses. The increased number of students in the classes will necessitate more course administrative time for faculty, and more time in office hours to meet with students one-on-one.
