The University of South Carolina Aiken has decided to close the Master of Education (M.Ed.) degree program in Learning Design and Technologies due to decreasing student interest. The final two students completed this program in spring 2021; no additional students have been admitted. The University previously offered the M.Ed. as a joint program with the University of South Carolina Columbia. The program will continue to be available at the University of South Carolina Columbia, although not as a joint venture. No faculty or staff members will be impacted by the closure.

The Board of Trustees of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges approves the closure of the Master of Education (M.Ed.) degree program in Learning Design and Technologies.
